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Alan's April 2nd, 2006 General Windows SIG by Alan Raul

SyncToy 1.2 for Windows XP (FREE) – is an easy to use, customizable application that helps you copy, move, rename, and delete files between folders and computers.

I tried to rush a demo of this little program at the end of the SIG. With time running out, I didn't do fair justice to demonstrating the program or explaining some of the circumstances it might be useful to the everyday user. So I have included it at the beginning of the review, hoping you will take the time to read further about this little jewel of a program.

Microsoft Windows Defender (Beta 2) (FREE) - is a program that helps protect your computer against pop-ups, slow performance, and security threats caused by spyware and other unwanted software. It features Real-Time Protection, a monitoring system that recommends actions against spyware when it's detected, and a new streamlined interface that minimizes interruptions and helps you stay productive.

Although this software wasn't demonstrated at the meeting, there were a lot of users which had already installed the software and seemed to be happy with the results.

April 2nd, 2006 Main Meeting Review by Bill Avery

Our Main Meeting was introduced by Ray Miklas who gave the floor over to member Dave McLaughlin [dave.mc40@pacbell.net], speaking about Exploration Station, which is a public benefit non-profit corporation, located at 867 Ramona Avenue at 9th, just a block up the hill from Grand Avenue in Grover Beach. They are in the Grover Beach Community Library (formerly the old firehouse). The program originally begun began around 2001 by Brantley Pettigrew of Mid State Bank and Trust. They rebuild donated computers and distribute them to clients around south San Luis Obispo County. Dave describes the program in a posting on our Slobytes BBS.

Brantley began rebuilding bank castoff PCs and giving them away. Rod Teets took the process over from him and moved it into the old firehouse that is now the EStation in 2001. Rod went to various computer groups around the county and recruited several of us, most are still there every Wednesday. He built workbenches and set up the

various jobs that we do. Rod passed away about two years ago, but his and Brantley's legacy continues: at last count there are nearly 21 of us there every week, and another few who help out when they can.

Also introduced was another member, and local computer stuff guy, Pete Gannon, who told us about his new SLO location for Computer Stuff, and Ebay-4-U, 1335 Monterey Street (formerly the Music Factory store), just uptown from his old location, next to the 7-11 store at Monterey Street and Johnson Avenue.

His shops are located in 3 stores in SLO County:

(His third store in Paso Robles was not listed in the Google Ads).

If you have anything you would like to sell on Ebay, Pete's new separate adventure, Ebay-4-U will list it and sell it, as a service to you, for a fee, depending on the value of the item sold. Up to \$500, their fee is 30 % of the final sale price, and above \$500, the fee is 25% of the final sale price. Pete suggests a lower limit of between \$30 and \$50 for this type of transaction, so all parties can make some profit, including the seller, Ebay, and Computer Stuff (operating as Ebay-4-U). He has about 30 auctions running at the present time, and they range from rare artwork to antique clocks to collectibles. Large items may require a photographer to come out for a \$30 fee, he said. You can take your own pictures, but they must conform to his requirements. A horse, or industrial machine, was cited as examples of a large item, and Pete can get them shipped, also. The lady he has running these sales has over 600 positives on Ebay, which indicates her good record, Pete noted. PayPal charges are also deducted by Ebay, as part of their service costs.

You need to certify that your item works, or meets a quality standard acceptable to the buyer.

One of the interesting opportunities for this service is for non-profit organizations to encourage members to donate their saleable items to that organization. Ebay-4-U will keep track of them to create an income for the organization, when they are sold, and they get the tax benefits also. If you have a business, you may want to get rid of old or excess inventory and you would lose a lot of profit if you chose to sell back that item to a wholesaler or another retailer. Pete can take that problem off your back and sell the item on Ebay for a profit, so it won't just sit on your shelf. All sales must be complete before any item ships, and the buyers check must clear the bank to do this. Flyers that describe this service are available at the Computer Stuff stores.

Pete Stonehewer introduced our main speaker, Ron Kindig, [ronkindig@charter.net] from the SLO Botanical Gardens, on Highway 1, across from Cuesta College. His topic was using a database program to store information on the plants in the garden. Their objective is to present up to date information on various types of plants which change with seasons, give it to visitors and display on signs around the site. Ron applies Filemaker Pro 8.0, and Photoshop CS2, to solve this problem. Common types of information for each plant could be repeated, digital photographs could be added and the results can be sorted on any particular type of information. Notes can be added to any particular entry. Ron attended George Lepp's Photoshop workshops (www.leppphoto.com) in Los Osos, and he highly recommended those sessions. We saw examples of photos which Ron processed in those workshops. He uses a Canon D60 digital camera with 35-135 image-stabilized lens, and 100 mm macro lens. His wife uses a smaller Canon Powershot, and to his great consternation, she got almost as good images as he did with his fancy single lens reflex camera! The viewfinder on her Powershot is slightly off center, but the LCD display on the back of the camera is completely accurate. Her lens is a combination macro and normal type, which focuses down to 2 inches, almost as good as the D60, Ron said.

The most important feature of a database is the container field, where slides, movies or audio can be inserted into an entry and presented in the results of a data sorting operation. This capability is found in both Filemaker Pro and Microsoft Access. Drag and drop operations allow a processed image to be transferred from its finished file in Photoshop to the container field in Filemaker Pro, or Access, very easily. Ron prints the final results with an Epson Stylus 2200, which uses pigmented ink, similar to that used with automobile paints. The images last a very long time when printed on a professional matte finish paper, even when exposed outdoors to the sun. Ron's current database contains information on 560 plants using 50 different fields, with 25 layouts for information sheets, signs, tour note cards for Docents, records of photos taken and photos needed, as well as lists of plants with and without photos for the public. The total file size is about 2.4 Gigabytes.

There is a virtual tour of the SLO Botanical Garden on their website, www.slobg.org and a binder that displays the contents of their publication, **128 of Our Best**, is for sale for \$25 at the Garden. Plans are being made for producing

this binder on a CD-ROM, also. A workshop is scheduled for Saturday, June 10, 2006 from 9 am to 4 pm on Beginning Digital Photography in the Garden with Garry Johnson and Ron Kindig. There is an advanced registration fee of \$35 for non-members or \$30 for SLO Botanical Garden members, via their website, for this event. The San Luis Obispo Botanical Garden is located on Highway 1 in [El Chorro Regional Park](#) between San Luis Obispo and Morro Bay. The Preview Garden is open during daylight hours, and admission is free.

We finished the meeting with our door-prize Quick-Pick raffle, and a good time was had by all.

The Digital Photography SIG met on April 16, 2006 at the home of Don Jones for an enlightening presentation by Deborah Jeffrey, a graphic designer and artist, on the use of a Wacom Intuos tablet with Photoshop Elements.

Intuos3 gives you the power to quickly and professionally edit photos and create digital artwork by turning on the full power of Adobe Photoshop, Corel Painter, and over 100 other leading software applications. Intuos3 tablets now put ExpressKeys and Touch Strips right at your fingertips for convenient keyboard shortcuts, scrolling, zooming, brush size control, and more.
