August SLO Bytes Meeting Review, by William Avery

Our new newsletter format continues with this issue. The report of the Early Meeting is simply a question and answer session with our sage explorer of the computing world, Alan Raul. His discussions are available on tape, for those who might wish to listen at a later date.

We started with an introduction to our new Bulletin Board, provided by Boardnation.com: <http://users.boardnation.com/~slobytes/index.php>. This project is done with YaBB SE, who explain: YaBB SE is a PHP/MySQL port of the popular forum software YaBB (yet another bulletin board). It incorporates the same intuitive user interface, and several of the most popular modifications from YaBB's Boardmod project. All that means is the Bulletin Board is very user friendly, and has several useful features, which Alan and Ralph showed to the group. I had to use Internet Explorer V.5.0 to access it, as my old Netscape 4.79 was unable to display the pages correctly. The posting of comments and questions for registered users only makes it somewhat like a newsgroup, and the html basis allows fancy graphics, such as an author's picture, to appear with their posting. Alan suggested that responses be written to the bulletin board rather than the individual poster. That way all readers will benefit from our shared solutions.

There is a point system to rate our usage of the BB, and each post equals a point. If we go over 7,000 points per month, then the system may restrict our usage. There is an ICQ style notification system, which you can set up to notify everyone on a list when you check into the BB. It was suggested that we reserve its use for SLO Bytes members, if possible.

Searching the posts is possible, and that can be handy, as Alan demonstrated. Pictures are a bit more challenging, and Ralph will set up a link to a web location where an image can be stored. Each user's settings can be configured, and passwords are set during that part of the registration.

We will see how this new system goes over the coming months, and adjust it as needed. The demonstration continued until it was time for our Coffee/Tea SIG, which met in the Break Room with a fine spread of cookies and treats for all to enjoy, hosted by Nancy Vrooman and Peter Stonehewer. Thanks for the memories!

The Main Meeting opened as Ray reminded us about the SIG meetings in the first week of each month: our Website / HTML group, the first Monday at Ralph Sutter's home in Arroyo Grande, and the Linux group at KCBX Tech Center, 4100 Vachell Lane in San Luis Obispo. As soon as we recognized and welcomed our guests, then Guy introduced our speaker, Doug Chanley, representing Alpha Software Inc., providing an overview of Alpha Five V.5, a relational database system. They describe it as follows:

Alpha Five Version 5 (A5V5) is the most feature-filled database and application development tool ever released by Alpha Software in its twenty year history. With Version 5 you are able to track,

report, and manage any information related to an activity or organization -- be it about people, projects, images, equipment or facilities. Version 5 introduces fundamental innovations to database software and adds a huge number of new capabilities that will appeal to users of all skill levels. The system is designed to provide the user with enormous power and flexibility in manipulating and reporting on data, without requiring the user have programming skills.

Alpha Software Inc. is located in Burlington, MA.

In his presentation, Doug provided database basics (what they are, including basic and relational database structures, and how to use them). He presented the Alpha Five database specifications and outlined some of the system's capabilities by describing the Control Panel, Building Tables and Sets, Field Types, Adding Field Rules, Design Techniques (for forms, reports, letters, and labels), Database Operations, and Action Scripting. He also discussed use of A5V5 with MS Word Mail Merge and MS Excel.

Doug has been using Alpha Software database products since 1990, first applying their DOS-based Alpha Four Version 2.1 and continuing with subsequent DOS versions until Alpha Five Version 1, a Windows-compatible system, was released. He developed his skills at the "learn by doing" school of hard knocks, starting out by developing business and home applications for personal use and moving to applications useful to his workplace. As President of Doug Chanley Personal Consulting, Delano CA, he spends about half of his time in consulting and development system applications. He is also part of a larger team working on projects with other developers in the Southern California area.

Doug asked how many people use a database at home, and several members raised their hands. Doug said the topic is a little dry as a subject for a presentation, so he hoped we would enjoy his discussion. First, he wanted to explain the difference between flat databases and relational databases. As an example of a flat database, he said an address book would be one type, as long as each entry is an independent piece of data. In relational databases, such as invoices, multiple tables can be displayed via linking information or keys, called parent and child keys. These are created by a set of rules. If a flat file such as an address book were to add an automatic ZIP-code lookup, then we could say it is a relational database. He went on to discuss additional features of the product.

Guy asked about a comparison with Microsoft's Access database program. He noted that Access features macro operations that are learned automatically. Doug responded that Alpha can learn keystroke sequences in a similar manner. Alpha's X-Basic script language is a more advanced feature not found in Access. Documents can be e-mailed, using either the internal mail function or an external program, such as Outlook. Reports will summarize database information, and present it in a user-friendly format. Guy wanted to know if bar-code fonts could be used, and Doug suggested asking the FAQ user inquiry on the website. Guy also noted that the logical depth of expressions

limits Access, which does not seem to be a problem with Alpha. Doug noted that large numbers of users could be handled by A5V5, also. He offered a 30-day trial CD ROM version for those members without a high-speed connection; otherwise all products are available via website downloads.

Our meeting ended with a Pick 'n' Win raffle and announcements for the SIGs next week. We gained 5 new members at this meeting, a club record, for sure. A prize Chessmaster CD was won by one of those lucky guys, too. Resume Maker went to a retiree, who will give it to a favorite grandchild. Kiplinger's "Simply Money" went to our very own Bird Watcher, Debby Schmitt. Norton Utilities, V.8 was a gift we gave to Fred Cook. The best prize was Alpha Five, which went home with Ralph Sutter.

Building on the presentation he gave in March, Steven will be presenting other ways in which users can reclaim some the joy of web browsing. Last time, guided by his presentation, we explored ways in which we could utilize the Mozilla web browser to block pop-up ads and to fix the number of times we actually have to watch the same animated advertisement. If that wasn't enough, we even learned how one could simply "right-click" on an offending image and choose to have all further images blocked from that server! This month Steven will return to demonstrate how the latest developments in Mozilla not only permit us to be more selective with advertisements displayed as images but can also be used to control Macromedia Flash as well! He will introduce us to the all new

'Click to Play' plug-in that lets you disable all Flash objects by default, while giving you the opportunity to "Click- to-Play" the Flash objects that YOU desire to see! Time permitting, we may look at using Mozilla as a spam resistant email reader and webpage-authoring tool, and may explore the latest developments with the new and improved Mozilla Firebird project.

Steven began tinkering with computers sometime in the late seventies and became serious about them in 1992. He discovered electronic Bulletin Boards in 1993 and the Internet in 1995. Since that time, he has endeavored to learn everything he can about electronic communications. The first time that you use the bulletin board, you'll need to register before you can access the site. Doing so is quick; easy and without charge. To register, at the above URL, click on the link aptly named "click here". That will take you to

Now return to users.boardnation.com/~slobytes and enter the username and password that you just created. Click on the bulletin board that interests you and the next screen will display the various topics of discussion. Click on a topic and it will display in chronological order all of the postings for the topic. If you wish to add your own comments, click on "Reply" at the bottom of the screen. To start a new topic, click on "New Topic" at the top of each bulletin board.
