Create slideshow in **Irfanview** commenting on need for naming files 01, 02, etc.

Goal: Get **Free YouTube Downloader**

Download.com: Browser helper download installs Potentially Unintended Programs, **PUP ware**, that changes browser, search engine, and adds programs

Many other download sites follow this dubious practice.

Finally, **confirm intended installation** by going to **Uninstall Programs**, sort by most recent and see if any unexpected programs are listed.

Spot the scam with **Filezilla** download scam: <https://filezilla-project.org/>

Who does it right? Download **Irfanview**: Use **Tucows**; <http://tucows.com/>. It offers other programs but doesn't try to trick you into installing them.

Irfanview installer: Allows you to decide the files for which it is the default application and then asks you to confirm your choice, sending the message; "Are you sure?"

President's Message by Earl Kaplan

First, let me thank Ralph for sitting in for both Alan and our scheduled presenter who decided commitments are not worth much.

Secondly I wanted to comment on a thread which ran through a lot of what Ralph was talking about and that was his repeated admonition to READ what was on the screen. I do not believe it can be stressed enough how important this one action can be to the health of your computer and its continued proper operation.

Almost every company that is trying to sell anything has someone who is suggesting additional ways to fool you into clicking on something simply because it stands between you and getting something downloaded, installed or just working. This is one of those times when taking it a little slower will speed up your experience a lot.



Keep in mind that just because you do not remember installing something does not mean you did not inadvertently install it while you were doing something totally disconnected from the mystery software. The only way around this is carefully looking at each screen in any install process and making sure that you carefully read the text near each checkbox (especially if the box is pre-checked) and make sure that you do read carefully since they know how to phrase the text so that it is hard to tell whether you want to answer yes or no in order to communicate a yes or a no.

One of the Latin phrases all of us should remember and keep in mind whenever we are installing software (especially Free software) is Caveat Emptor. That means let the buyer beware and is most assuredly meaningful when loading free software. A few seconds reading some boring text can save a lot of time figuring out how some horrible junk malware got onto your machine.
