September 2nd, 2007 Main Meeting Review by Ralph Sutter

HTML SIG Leader Ralph Sutter spoke on how to build simple web pages using the following free software and services

Freeware HTML Editor – NVU – <u>http://www.nvu.com</u> Free web space – Free Hostia – <u>http://www.freehostia.com</u> Free FTP Program – Core FTP – <u>http://www.coreftp.com/</u>

You may create a HTML document by composing it in Microsoft Word and saving it not with the extension .doc but rather with the extension .htm or .html. Simply choose this extension in the **save as** choices.

Ralph does not recommend using Microsoft Word as a HTML editor for those who plan to develop a multi-page web site. Among Word's limitations are that it doesn't write valid html code and it creates a separate folder for every page containing graphics, in addition to the actual .html page itself. This makes a multi-page site unnecessarily large and difficult to maintain.

Sutter also cautions against creating your web page on-line. If you make a mistake, you may not be able to return to an earlier version of the page. A better strategy is to compose the page off-line on your computer and then upload it to the Internet when you have finished.

You will find numerous resources on-line to help you build web pages. Two such resources are www.fullbean.com/html.html and http://htmlsig.slobytes.org/index.html.

To learn more about developing your own web pages, join the other members of the HTML SIG group at our monthly meeting. It takes place on the Tuesday evening following the SLO Bytes General meeting.
