Alan's February 5th, 2006 General Windows SIG by Alan Raul

Adobe Acrobat 3D - software enriches collaboration by enabling extended teams to use Adobe PDF documents to more securely and reliably communicate 3D design intent. Insert and publish 3D designs from major CAD applications in Adobe PDF documents that can easily be shared with suppliers, partners, and customers using free Adobe Reader 7.0 software. http://www.adobe.com/products/acrobat3d/main.html

CCleaner - is a Freeware system optimization and privacy tool. It removes unused files from your system - allowing Windows to run faster and freeing up valuable hard disk space. It also cleans traces of your on-line activities such as your Internet history. http://www.ccleaner.com/

Why use this: Over time your computer and registry can become cluttered with old code that installers left behind during install or un- installers didn't delete. This can cause you to lose precious disk space as well as slow down the performance of your computer. Take back your computer and clean it up!

How to use this: Before cleaning, you need to configure a couple of things first. So go to Options, Cookies, and move the cookies you don't want deleted over to the Cookies to Keep list. Now go to Custom, click Add Folder, and add C:\WINDOWS\Downloaded Installations to the list of custom folders to clean. Go back to Cleaner, un-check Old Prefetch data in the System section and check both IIS Log Files and Custom Files and Folders in the Advanced section. Look through the Windows and Applications tab to configure what you want to be cleaned and then click Run Cleaner.

When you're ready to clean your registry, go to Issues and click Scan for issues. When it finishes, scan over the issues that were found and select all the issues you want to delete then click Fix selected issues.... When it asks if you'd like to make a backup, do so and save it somewhere you can find later if needed. Click Fix All Selected Issues on the next window and click Close when it's done. Make sure to scan for registry issues more than once, sometimes deleting an entry could make another entry invalid.

You can buy various (8) **muvee stylePacks** to further enhance your productions. Each style pack contains at least 6 styles and lets you transform your videos with a whole new look.

PhotoVista Panorama 3.5 - iSeeMedia www.iseemedia.com was another product that David demonstrated. This product automatically stitches a series of photos together into a spectacular 360 seamless, interactive panoramic photo that you can print, share, send as an e-mail, or publish to any website. The featured speakers at the March 5th SLO Bytes meeting will be Pat and Kenny Keith, owners and operators of **Computer-Works** located at 207 W. Main Street, Santa Maria (boolseye@comcast.net, 805-347-1076). Computer-Works is a PC service and repair company.

The Keith's presentation will be focused on the software contained within the Computer-Works Essential Utility CD, showing the audience the best way to keep their computers safe from spyware, viruses and hackers. These disks contain many useful utilities, including anti-virus and anti-spyware programs, a file management utility, an Office suite and many other useful programs with general applicability. Ron will demonstrate the flexibility of using a single database for a variety of purposes; showing us the stages he went through learning how to organize plant information, including digital photos, prepare Garden signs, plant information sheets, and illustrated plant booklets for the public. Ron will be describing the digital cameras, lenses and techniques he used to obtain beautiful pictures of plants and flowers. Currently Ron Kindig has used this database for over twenty purposes. Handouts will be available for all attendees. Plan now to attend this meeting, it has something for everyone.
