Starr talked about the benefits of these sites, especially Facebook and Myspace as places to meet people "relatively" safely. You can build up friendships that exist just on the web, the advantage here is that the scope of your acquaintance can be world-wide. Because of this, people who have problems getting around such as handicapped, or elderly, can still maintain human contacts with others. In the old days it was done via mail, now it is via social networking.

As a marketing tool it can be quite powerful as you have access to a larger audience.

Most of these sites are designed for meeting people, but Twitter is a bit different. It is a messaging system with the messages limited to 140 characters. A single message is a 'tweet', if you follow a tweet-er you receive their tweets.
