Dr. Watson is installed in your system folder when you set up Windows XP. You can access Dr. Watson by typing "**drwtsn32.exe**" in the run dialog box. March 4th, 2007 Main Meeting Review by Ginny Monteen

Detective **Ron Waltman** spoke to a full audience March 4 about the SLO Sheriff's Department Sexual Assault Unit and some of the pro-active methods they use to accomplish their goals, including tracking people using the Internet.

To illustrate just how much information can be gathered from the net, he brought a thick dossier on Kaye Raul, SLO Bytes Program Chair, sharing with us some of the more cogent details!

Digital database technology is used by law enforcement now to increase effectiveness. Waltman told stories how in LA they were able to apprehend suspects more quickly using data available on the net. From sources information such as property listings, criminal histories, public databases, even floor plans and satellite images, a search can be mounted quickly and effectively.

He told how a drawing of a suspect can be run through police system photos to produce a number of possible matches. These photos can be used in an electronic 'six-pack' (photos of six suspects grouped

and sent electronically) to speed up witness identification.

Access to information on sex offenders was helped by the passage of Megan's Law in 1996. That access changed dramatically with a new law, passed in 2004, that makes the information available on-line at <u>http://www.meganslaw.ca.gov/</u>. Waltman said that before being listed on the Internet, there had been one million calls for information in eight years. Once on Internet, there were 70 million hits within eight weeks.

From the California Megan's Law website:

"Megan's Law is named after seven-year-old Megan Kanka, a New Jersey girl who was raped and killed by a known child molester who had moved across the street from the family without their knowledge. In the wake of the tragedy, the Kankas' sought to have local communities warned about sex offenders in the area. All states now have a form of Megan's Law."

Back in 1947, California was the first state to require registration of sex offenders, Waltman said. However, it was the 44th state to get the information mounted on the Internet. SLO County has 475 sex offenders, he said, but not all offenders are listed on Internet. One-third are not listed because their crimes are less serious. In our county, 52 percent are not listed. The current law requires sex offenders to register once a year on their birthday, or when they move. Transients must register every 30 days.

Waltman also commented on the Amy Boyer Law which protects social security numbers. The law outlaws the display, sale or use of social security numbers in certain circumstances. The bill is named for Amy Boyer, the victim of an Internet stalker who obtained her address from an Internet information broker.

Some privacy protection advice from Waltman:

- Don't carry your checkbook or social security number with you.
- Be stingy about giving out personal information.
- Don't fill out warranty cards; they're just for marketing purposes.

In addition, Waltman handed out three pages of information:

• A humorous, and scary, article written by syndicated columnist Tom Purcell, detailing a hypothetical phone conversation where the caller knew way too much information about the person called.

• An article on identity theft from the Orange County Register, giving do's and don'ts.

• An article, Don Ray's 104 Privacy Tips.

An addition, Waltman mentioned a good website on skip tracing: <u>http://www.geocities.com/monaco90/skiptrace.html</u>

(BTW, skip tracing is the process of locating a person's whereabouts for any number of purposes, such as debt collections, bail bond enforcement (bounty hunting), witness location, questioning, or almost any facet of an investigation.)

After 30 years with the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department, Waltman was persuaded to join the SLO

Department. He is a member of the newly formed Department of Justice SAFE Team (Sexual Assault Felony Enforcement), whose goals include enhancing sex offender registration compliance rates, apprehending and prosecuting those registrants who are in violation, and educating the public. The unit was recently awarded a grant of \$675,000 to further its effectiveness.

Microsoft Windows Vista will be the main topic at the April 1st meeting of the SLO Bytes PC Users Group presented by **Alan Raul.** Windows Vista is the latest release of Microsoft Windows, an operating system used on personal computers (PC's), including home and business desktops, notebook computers, Tablet PC's and media centers. On January 30, 2007, it was released worldwide to the general public.

Windows Vista contains hundreds of new features; some of the most significant include an updated graphical user interface (GUI) and visual style dubbed Windows Aero, improved searching features, new multimedia creation tools such as Windows DVD Maker and completely redesigned networking, audio, print, and display sub-systems. Vista also aims to increase the level of communication between machines on a home network using peer-to-peer technology, making it easier to share files and digital media between computers and devices.

Microsoft's primary stated objective with Vista, however, has been to improve the state of security in the Windows operating system.

Microsoft Office 2007, the most recent version of Microsoft's productivity suite will also be demonstrated. Office 2007 contains a number of new features, the most notable of which is the entirely new graphical user interface called the Ribbon. The traditional menus and toolbars have been replaced by the Ribbon - a new device that presents commands organized into a set of tabs. The tabs on the Ribbon display the commands that are most relevant for each of the task areas in the applications, replacing the menus and toolbars that have been the cornerstone of Office since its inception.

He stressed the need to know and use the *print profile* of the particular paper you are using. Unless the proper *print profile* of the paper is installed on your computer it will be difficult or impossible to end up with really true colors. These *print profiles* are available on the Internet by Googling the paper manufacturer, then searching for your brand of printer.

Dave showed us much of the amazingly beautiful work he had done on his professional quality printers. These printers not only render beautiful fidelity but are capable of making poster sized prints as well. He also advised us that Costco's brand, Kirkland, is a good quality paper available at reasonable prices.

Later, Don Jones led us through some of the tricks he has learned in the making of background effects with the use of the multiple layers options in PhotoShop Elements. Active audience participation was enthusiastic. As always good coffee and cookies topped off a pleasant, informative meeting.
