Pay close attention to the URL's that are shown and make sure they are really from who they purport to be from. Don't open email from a source you never heard of. If it is from a major company you are familiar with, read the last paragraph and make sure it is from who it pretends to be from.

Each of us is the best defense against malware. Read, think, and delay that click. It could make a big difference
