The advantage to this method is that our initial email information is compact, and we can store the original file on a website that will serve (or send) it out to any member that wishes to read it. For this change to be effective we must have accurate email addresses for every member, so please advise our club if you have any new email address information. Primarily, that means to contact our Treasurer, Bob Mires, **rmires@sbcglobal.net** or **481-2715** in Grover Beach, if you have a new email address. After that announcement, Ray called on the leaders of our Special Interest Groups to explain their areas of activity.

We saw some slides of last year's BBQ, from our Photo Gallery http://www.slobytes.org/gallery/index.html. Come July 2nd, and bring your friends and guests. Be sure to advise Ralph Sutter of the number in your party.

We had a scheduled speaker, Lee Otsubo, who was unable to visit our meeting. We reviewed his presentation on a DVD, on Digital Cameras, instead. He is known as "The Digital Photo Guy", and his website http://www.thedigitalphotoguy.com/ is a complete index to his many resources, including the instructional CD

The Digital Photo Guy interviewed by John Iasiulous on Computer Outlook Radio Talk Show at the 12th Annual Southwest Computer Users Group Conference in San Diego, in August, 2005. This includes the one we watched, "Digital Photo Guy Workshop CD", which contains the TDPG Workshop "How to Get the Most out of Your Digital Camera (or How to buy One) and How to Share & Display Your Digital Photos". That workshop covers the six major parts of a digital camera as well as the four most popular ways of sharing and displaying digital photos.

Lee recommends "Steve's Digicam" http://www.dpreview.com/ Websites as valuable resources for digital photographers. He also offers webcasts, on various aspects of digital cameras, such as the "Digital SLR for New DSLR Owners", and "Digital Photography in 3 Hours". His DigiCue Cards are short summaries of topics related to his Tutorials and Shareware CD, including one called "Windows XP Imaging Tools".

If you want to make a digital scrapbook, then try Lee's "Scrapbook MAX!" which "provides a user-friendly workspace, dozens of creative templates, hundreds of background designs, thousands of embellishments, and powerful photo enhancement tools", he says. The price is \$39.95, on his website. We listened to about 50 minutes of straight talk on how digital cameras are like digital computers, and interesting tips on how to use them, even if you are not quite a pro. We have these CDs as a resource for our future meetings.

Our meeting concluded with the Quick Pick door- prize raffle, and a look ahead to our Second of July BBQ! Wave your flags, and have a great time at SLOBYTES!

Announcement from SLO Bytes Webmaster regarding future delivery of HardCopy

Beginning in August, 2006, you will begin receiving SLO Bytes' monthly newsletter, HardCopy in a new way. It is currently sent to you in its entirety in the body of an e-mail message. It is also posted as a .pdf file on the SLO Bytes web site at http://www.slobytes.org/news.htm#current-year. With the August edition, you will only receive an announcement letting you know that the latest edition of the newsletter is available on-line at the above address.

Many of you are already familiar with .pdf files and use Adobe Acrobat Reader frequently. Others may have limited or no experience with these files. Typically, when you click on a file ending with the extension .pdf, your computer automatically opens the file with Adobe Acrobat or whatever .pdf reader you have installed on your system. If you do not have a .pdf reader installed, you can download and install the Freeware program, Adobe Acrobat Reader, from www.adobe.com/products/acrobat/readstep2.html.

I will use the newly created SLO Bytes announcements <u>listserv</u> to let you know of the availability of the August edition of HardCopy. A listserv is somewhat like group of e-mail addresses or distribution list. The difference is that it resides on a server rather than on an individual member's computer. It will allow any SLO Bytes Officer to send a message to all SLO Bytes members. (provided that you notified Bob Mires, SLO Bytes Membership Chair if your e-mail address changed). The listserv allows our club to maintain one e-mail list rather than having to deal with different versions of the list among the various SLO Bytes officers. If you, as a SLO Bytes member, wish to send comments or post announcements to the whole group, please do so through our bulletin board. If you reply to the listserv, your message will only go to Ray Miklas and me.

At the meeting of the 19th we continued to learn about using PhotoShop Elements to enhance our digital photographs. We went over again the process of using layers to do such things as blurring the background of an ordinary picture resulting in an image that is more in keeping with a portrait. Don Jones also led us through the use of the Organizer within Elements. He showed how it is possible to tag a series of photos so that they can be recalled at will in order to be treated in various ways such as the making of slide shows. Tagging the photos in this manner precludes the necessity of creating separate folders or files for any particular grouping.

We did briefly touch upon the use of the Template Editor and how it is possible to make a menu for our DVDs and also the use of Premiere Elements in conjunction with PhotoShop Elements.

The coffee and chocolate chip cookies provided by Mrs. Jones were delicious and much appreciated by all.
