October, 2004 - Main Meeting Review by W. Avery

At 2:15 PM, we had our Social SIG, the mid-meeting highlight, featuring great cookies and treats with fresh coffee and teas, carefully served by our volunteer hostess, Nancy Vrooman. She set it up so our members and guests can enjoy a chance to catch up on the past month and share problems and solutions on a one-to-one basis. We resumed promptly at 2:30PM in the main hall, as many members were interested in the free CD-ROM offered by our featured-speakers, Pat and Kenny Keith from ComputerWorks boolseye@gte.net, 207 W. Main St., Santa Maria, CA 93458 - phone: 805-347-1076; - fax: 805-347-0018.

Ray made our announcements of the club activities, which include the HTML SIG, and Linux SIG, scheduled for the first Monday and Thursday evenings of every month (which follow our General monthly meeting), respectively. These meetings are held at Ralph Sutter's home in Arroyo Grande and the KCBXnet Training Center in SLO. We asked our guests in the meeting to be welcomed and note how they had heard about our group.

If you have pictures to share on our website, please bring your files for download to the Treasurer's Table, and we will save them to a hard disk for transfer to our website, thanks to Ralph Sutter. The table is also the place to renew your membership (or change your address) and checkout software which we can loan from our CD-ROM library. Also, any old ink cartridges which you have saved from your printers can be dropped off at the table, for Ray Miklas and Dave Grant who turn them over to "Make A-Wish Foundation" who generate much needed funds for their organization by refurbishing and selling them.

Guy Kuncir introduced the main speakers, Pat and Kenny Keith of ComputerWorks, who had an excellent presentation on several aspects of PC computing, and who gave us copies of their store "Essential Utility CD-ROM", with the freshest downloads he could get for 21 programs, (including Windows XP SP2 Update) showing us the best way to keep our computers safe from spyware, viruses and hackers. The disks contain useful utilities, including anti-virus and anti-spyware programs, a file management utility, an Office suite and many other useful programs with general applicability. The ComputerWorks' CD has been compiled over the last year and a half, selecting the best "freeware" programs they believe to be available. It also contains some shareware software, these being included where good versions of the desired capabilities could not be found; such as "Diskeeper Trial, ver. 8.0", being one such shareware program. These CDs were provided to all attendees free of charge, on-hand supplies permitting. The extremely popular CDs are also offered at their store at no charge and have been mentioned in the weekly Santa Maria Times' column that Pat writes.

A handout described each of the Utility Programs, so we had an exact overview of the CD-ROM. As time permitted, Pat explained how each one works; and gave us the benefit of his comments, based on many years experience in the computer business. His favorite Utility is "PCOpus", which will remind older users of the famous XTree-Gold, previously produced here in San Luis Obispo!

For removal of Spyware, he likes "Spysweeper", "Adaware", and "SpyBot". Pat uses all 3 programs for best coverage. The personal firewall, "ZoneAlarm Free" is highly recommended. For popup protection, try the free program, "Popup Washer".

To quote Bob Gromer's notes: "A pop-up blocker is the first line of defense against intrusion and viruses". For up to date information, check the Symantec Antivirus Response Center at: www.sarc.com. If you are using Norton Antivirus, Intelligent Updater will provide the latest virus definitions. There is also LiveUpdate, which adds only the new information to your current system, weekly. Pat noted that the other Antivirus program, AVG, and Norton Antivirus do not conflict, which is a new viewpoint on this situation, at least within our general practices in the club.

There are some new ways to control the startup of your system, such as "Startup Cop", and "Startup Control Panel". They will help prevent any unwanted programs from running each time you start your system, by eliminating them from the startup sequence, while allowing other desirable programs to load automatically. Additionally, the "TweakXP" utility will offer extended control of your WinXP system, (with a free 30-view-trial shareware limitation). Many utilities, including a registry cleaner, are built into this one program, which is priced at \$39.95.

For protection against operator error, "PC Inspector" will help with data recovery, if you accidentally delete any information.

Other utilities on the disk include a DVD editor, "DVD Decryptor", a peer-to-peer file sharing utility, "P2P", and a life-like screen saver, "Serene Screen Aquarium."

According to Pat, the best browser is Opera, ver. 7.54.

He also included Mozilla Firefox, ver. 1.0 RC1. The final version being released on November 9th.

Pat noted that the government is recommending discontinuing use of Internet Explorer!

Note: Pat said that many of the programs on the Utility disk will NOT run under Win98.

Currently the Keith's are not recommending installation of SP2, unless it is installed on a freshly installed system.

We finished the meeting with our QuickPik raffle, and look forward to seeing you next month for the everpopular digital camera updates from Dennis Johansen of Jims Campus Camera.
