We discussed a lot of the major and not-so-major software updates which were recently released. Some of the major updates were: Acronis True Image 11, Adobe PhotoShop Elements 6, Ahead Nero 8.110, Microsoft Office 2003 Service Pack 3 and Sun Java Runtime Environment 6 Update 3.

Another highlight of the SIG was the **2Wire DSL Gateway 2701HG-B** http://snipurl.com/1sitm which is available from AT&T. This device takes the place of the DSL modem and a wireless 4-port router/access point. You can access the gateway options by entering any of the following into a web browser. Some URL's will show you a different interface.

Make sure you keep your Windows XP/Vista operating system updated and use the firewall. Vista also has an outbound firewall that can be enabled. Use anti-virus/anti-spyware and keep them updated. Most importantly, "THINK BEFORE YOU CLICK".

October 15th Digital Photography SIG Review by Nancy Vrooman

Don kicked off the meeting with the announcement of the lowest price to date he's seen on Paint Shop Pro. Sale over by the time you read this. For future reference it was \$49.95 at Best Buy. Sue uses this program and had to rely on books and on-line tutorials as no local classes/user groups exist. It's a top rated photo editing program.

Discussion shifted back to PhotoShop Elements and we visited their excellent on-line site --http://www.photoshopelementsuser.com/. To avail yourself of the extensive specific tutorials you need to ante up \$49 for a year subscription which also includes 8 mail-issues of the slim

Elements magazine not available elsewhere. Otherwise you will have to content yourself with the forums (beginner, advanced, general, etc.). Scroll 1/2 way down the home page until you see Join Our Community on the right-hand side. No need to join unless you want to post. And what can you find in the forum? How about a link to FREE tutorials --www.hummiesworld.com/tutorials.html Donations gladly accepted.

Bob's question regarding saving images to a specific pixel ratio brought up resizing vs. resampling vs. cropping. Creating a collage came next thanks to Gary & Don. Pure instant joy in ver.4+ and possibly 3. One of the most asked for directions. No wonder. They weren't in either of my books. Go to http://kb.adobe.com/selfservice/viewContent.do?externalld=332336 for one easy method. Be sure to save as a PhotoShop file (psd) if you want to do future adjustments. One I saved as a .jpg was 351 Kb and grew to 5209 Kb when also saved as a .psd.

Lastly Adobe is promoting Elements 6 by providing excellent "teaser" videos on their site. Look for the link. The new clone stamp is very impressive with its transparent overlay as is the Guided Edit, Group Shot. The Raw Editor smartly displays tool sliders arranged in the order to be used. Its interface is almost a duplicate of Lightroom. Difficult to read with poor eyesight (isn't everything). And a time line slider to find your photos from last Mother's Day is included. We could not determine if it can 'render' to a DVD (older version don't). If you have ver.2 this would be a dramatic increase in capabilities. If you have a new system with Vista, it is strongly recommended.
